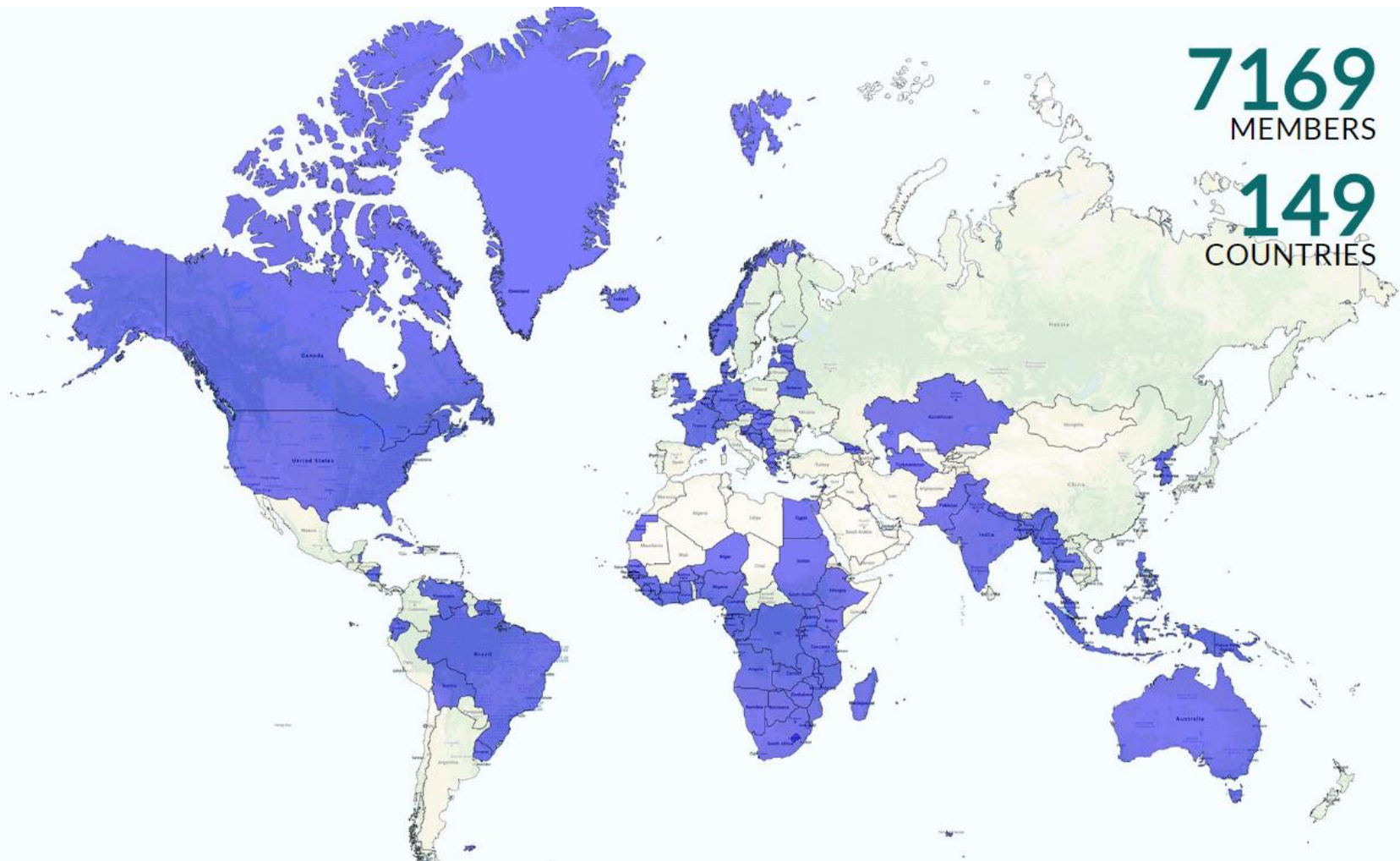

Cyclones Idai & Kenneth

March-April 2019

- 3 million people in the Southern Africa region affected, more than 1,000 deaths
- In Mozambique alone, the two cyclones impacted:
 - 2.2 million people
 - 240,000 homes
 - 1,372 schools
 - 3,490 km of roads
- Cholera outbreak 4,000+ cases
- 113 health units were damaged partially or fully including equipment, furniture, essential medicine & medical supplies (WHO Mozambique)

- Nadyia: What would be the challenges and opportunities of being on a roster of SC emergency responders?

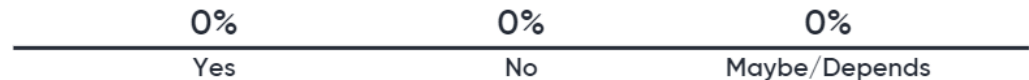

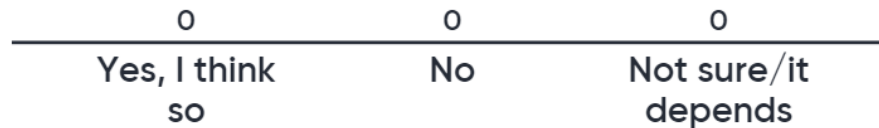
