


University of Rwanda

- UR is the national university housing all public institutions of higher learning.
- UR has 6 Colleges with 23 schools and 18 CoEs, distributed in 16 campuses.
- Total enrollment 28,609 (2017/2018),
- The EAC RCE-VIHSCM falls under the College of Medicine and Health Sciences (CMHS), School of Public Health (SPH). The College has 4 other schools —Medicine and Pharmacy, Nursing, Dentistry, and School of Health Sciences. It has 3 CoEs RCE-VIHSCM, Mental Health, and Biomedical Engineering and e-Health (CEBE).



Training Component Progress

- Curriculum developed and approval by the HEC Plus mutual recognition by IUCEA & EAC Partner States (2015 & 2017)
- Quality Assurance Policy 2015 –developed in collaboration with IUCEA
- Training materials development (new ones and adaptation)
- Development of e-Learning platform (2017)
- Recruitment of expert skills in HSCM
- First and 2nd cohort-master's degrees ongoing
- Development and operationalization of the RCE Web-portal.



Short Course Training Component Progress

- Targets as per Business Plan 2016-2020: 1,676 students
- TNA
- Domestication of training materials; global HSCM community
- The RCE has **trained 252** SC professionals in collaboration with GAVI/UPS/IFPW,UNICEF, BMGF/JSI, UNPFA, GSK/KU Leuven
- Pool of trainers in 4 EAC countries (Kenya, Uganda, Rwanda and SS) -1 Mtg in 2017
- Decentralized training plans with partner institutions
- Working with partners to boost the HHL program in the RCE including training and TA



Research Component

What has been done so far?

- A Desk review to inform RCE research agenda;
- Research strategy has been developed
- Feasibility study on cross-border SC in EAC
- Created a repository of more than 302 peer reviewed articles and reports on HSCM at <u>www.hscm.ur.ac.rw</u>
- Master students research thesis a low hanging fruit
- 2 PhD Projects
 - ✓ Quality, availability of Essential Medicines
 - ✓ Immunization Supply re-design (Rwanda-Kenya)



Take Home Message

Reasons RCE was formed 4 years ago are even more urgent today: new epidemic threats and new vaccine technologies, cf Ebola, Malaria, Anti-vaxers; *Therefore support the RCE meet its objectives*;

- ➤ Help be the RCE *champion* at international fora;
- Support the RCE develop new and innovative short-courses in HHL, looking for partnerships in the area of EVD;
- Support resource mobilization [Donors' Round Table Conference, 30 Oct, 2019 in Nairobi. 5-in-1.
- Develop collaborations with teaching & research institutions, CSOs, Industry
- mobilize more resources for impactful research.
- Bring African SCM cadres to learn at the RCE
